

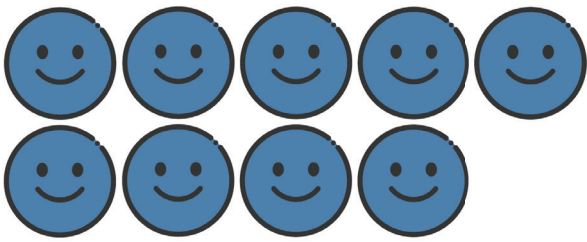

Better Services, Better Access to Care, Better Value

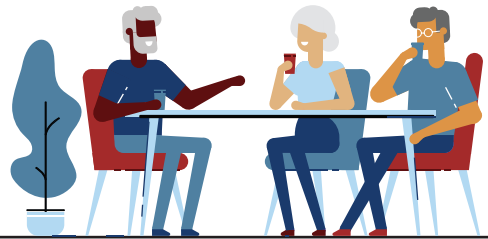
Over 27 million Americans choose Medicare Advantage — that's 44% of all those eligible to enroll. Medicare Advantage provides seniors and people with disabilities the opportunity to choose the coverage that's right for them, with expanded benefits like capped out-of-pocket costs and prescription drug coverage. And the choice is clear: Medicare Advantage provides better services, better access to care, and better value.



We talked to senior voters across the country to hear what they really think about their coverage. **Here's what we found.**



93% of senior voters are satisfied with their Medicare Advantage.



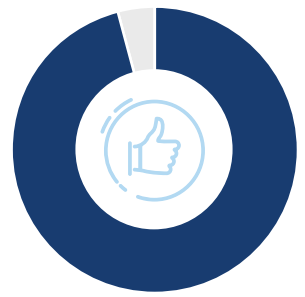
Nearly 60% of senior voters are very satisfied with their Medicare Advantage.



Nearly 9 in 10 senior voters with Medicare Advantage report they are satisfied with their prescription drug coverage.



9 in 10 senior voters with Medicare Advantage report they are satisfied with their preventive services, like screenings, vaccines, and testing.

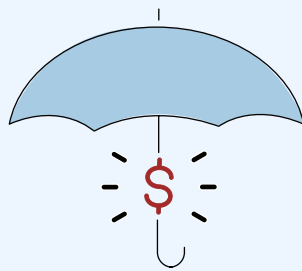


96% of senior voters with Medicare Advantage would recommend it to their family and friends.

Senior voters covered by Medicare Advantage are satisfied with their coverage and comprehensive benefits. But seniors are concerned about their ability to afford health care and other necessary expenses:



Nearly 75% of senior voters on Medicare Advantage say their **ability to afford** health care and other necessary expenses would be impacted if their Medicare premiums increased.



Over 80% of senior voters on Medicare Advantage say they are **concerned about cuts** to their current benefits due to recent reports about rising inflation rates.



Seniors say **higher premiums for Part D** (66%) and Part B (62%) would affect their ability to afford their health care and other expenses.



3 in 4 senior voters say it is important the federal government protect funding for Medicare Advantage.



2 in 3 senior voters would be more likely to vote for their Member of Congress if they supported more funding for Medicare Advantage.



2 in 3 senior voters think the federal government should fund Medicare Advantage at a rate that fully covers increasing health care costs.
