

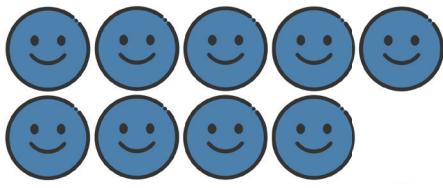
Medicare Advantage

Better Services, Better Access to Care, Better Value

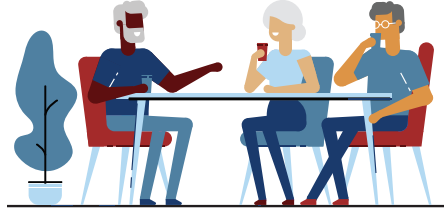
Over 30 million Americans choose Medicare Advantage — that's about half of all those eligible to enroll. Medicare Advantage provides seniors and people with disabilities the opportunity to choose the coverage that's right for them and offers expanded benefits like capped out-of-pocket costs and prescription drug coverage. And the choice is clear: Medicare Advantage provides better services, better access to care, and better value. The Administration released its advance rate notice for Medicare Advantage, and the proposed changes in the release could result in serious cuts to the program.



We talked to senior voters across the country to hear what they really think about their coverage. Here's what we found.



94% of senior voters are satisfied with their Medicare Advantage.



60% of senior voters are very satisfied with their Medicare Advantage.



95% of senior voters with Medicare Advantage are satisfied with the access to care their coverage provides.



9 in 10 senior voters with Medicare Advantage report they are satisfied with their prescription drug coverage.

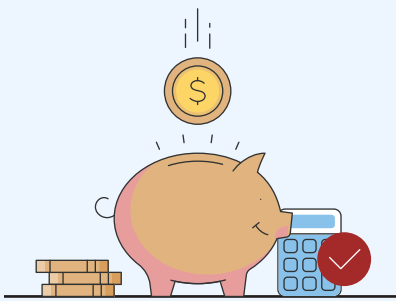


More than 9 in 10 senior voters with Medicare Advantage report they are satisfied with their preventive services, like screenings, vaccines, and testing.



93% of senior voters with Medicare Advantage would recommend it to their family and friends.

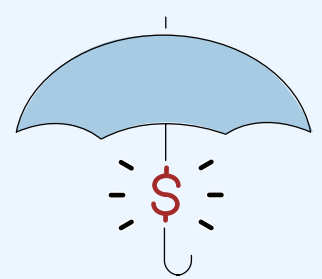
Senior voters covered by Medicare Advantage are satisfied with their coverage and comprehensive benefits. But seniors are concerned about their ability to afford health care and other necessary expenses:



90% of senior voters with Medicare Advantage are satisfied with the **affordability of their coverage**.



7 in 10 senior voters with Medicare Advantage say their **ability to afford** health care and other necessary expenses would be impacted if their Medicare premiums increased.



3 in 4 senior voters with Medicare Advantage say they are **concerned about cuts** to their current benefits due to recent reports about rising inflation rates.



4 in 5 senior voters say it is important that the federal government and the Biden Administration protect funding for Medicare Advantage.



7 in 10 senior voters would be more likely to vote for their Member of Congress if they supported more funding for Medicare Advantage.



7 in 10 senior voters think the federal government should fund Medicare Advantage at a rate that fully covers increasing health care costs.
